

Phonics Classroom Activity

Decodable Readers

Overview

This set of printable decodable readers is designed to support students in the earliest stages of phonics instruction. The readers follow a research-based sequence that introduces high-utility and midfrequency consonants alongside short vowels. Students will encounter CVC words they can decode independently, supported by simple sentence structure, repetition, and engaging illustrations.

Why This Set Matters

With just the first few letters—m, a, s, p, t—students can begin forming words like "map", "mat", and "sat." This collection expands that foundation with additional consonants and vowels to build broader decoding power and sentence-level fluency. This is a critical phase in the phonics journey, where readers begin applying sound-symbol relationships to real text in a supportive, success-oriented format.

Focus: High-Utility and Mid-Frequency Consonants + Short Vowels

Target Letters: m, a, s, p, t, i, n, b, c, o, f, h, d, r, g, e, l, k

Grade Range: PreK-1

Goal: Help early readers build decoding fluency and confidence using foldable decodable readers featuring simple consonant-vowel-consonant (CVC) word patterns and common consonant-vowel sounds.

Materials Needed

- Printed decodable reader
- Pencils or crayons
- Optional: highlighters, sticky notes, or reading trackers

Instructions

- 1. **Introduce the Focus Sounds:** Before reading, review the target sound-spellings that appear in the book. Highlight a few example words together.
- Model a First Read: Read the first page aloud or use echo reading. Support students as they decode CVC words and use picture clues.











- Independent or Take-Home Reading: Students reread the book on their own or with a caregiver. Encourage repeated reading across several days to build fluency.
- **4. Optional Response Activity:** Use included prompts to extend comprehension: draw your favorite part, write a CVC word from the story, or complete a sentence frame.

Tips for Differentiation

- Use letter tiles or sound boxes to build focus words before reading.
- Highlight familiar high-frequency words (e.g., the, is, a) to support flow.
- Provide sentence frames or picture cues for retelling.
- For students who are ready for more of a challenge, use a blank mini-book to create their own version using the same letter set.

Wrap-Up Questions

- What words in the book could you sound out?
- Did you find any words that started or ended with our focus letters?
- How did reading it more than once help you?





Student Practice Readers



Each foldable reader uses CVC words built from the target sequence and includes simple illustrations and sentence repetition.

Reader 1: Sam and the Bag

Focus sounds: m, a, s, t, p, b

CVC examples: mat, sat, tap, bag, map

Sam has a bag.

The bag is on the mat.

Sam taps the bag.

A map is in the bag.

Reader 2: Hot Dog

Focus sounds: h, o, d, g, r

CVC examples: dog, hop, got, had, rod

The dog is hot.

The dog got up.

Dad got a fan.

The dog had a nap.

Reader 3: The Big Cat

Focus sounds: c, a, t, m, b

CVC examples: cat, mat, nap, pat

The cat is big.

The cat is on the mat.

The cat had a nap.

Sam pats the cat.

Reader 4: Pam Can Hop

Focus sounds: p, a, m, h, o

CVC examples: Pam, hop, mat, box, Mom

Pam can hop.

Pam hops on a mat.

Pam hops in a big box.

Pam hops to Mom.

Reader 5: Dad and the Cap

Focus sounds: h, o, d, g, r

CVC examples: Dad, cap, red, peg, bed

Dad has a cap.

The cap is red.

Dad sets it on a peg.

Dad naps on the bed.

Reader 5: Ben Gets a Pet

Focus sounds: b, e, n, g, t, s

CVC examples: Ben, net, pet, bug, set

Ben has a net.

Ben gets a pet.

The pet is a bug.

Ben sets the bug free.
